ABAC students call experience in India 'life-changing'

Since 2013, students from Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College have traveled to India in the spring to help build international understanding through photography.

ABAC graduate Devin Gibbs, who met the Dalai Lama on her trip in 2013, called the program "life changing."

Recent trips have focused on the struggle for survival of elephants and coffee farmers in southern India. Students helped produce a documentary called "Elephants in the Coffee." Now we're seeking students join the effort to find solutions to the conflict.

The most successful effortshas come from the largest coffee grower, who tracks elephants in the estates and uses cell phone communication to alert workers and move them to safe areas. We are exploring how media and communication might be adapted in even more ways to help save elephants and famers.
