#### Oregon Nikkei Legacy Center

Japanese American History Museum located in Old Town District, where Japantown thrived prior to the internment of Japanese Americans in World War II.



#### **Chinatown Historic District**

Portland's oldest neighborhood is an old-style Chinatown with an eclectic mix of restaurants, lunch spots, and tea shops in centuries-old brick buildings.



### **Portland Japanese Garden**

5.5 acres with five styles of Japanese Gardens, opened in 1967. *Journal of Japanese Gardening* ranked it 2<sup>nd</sup> out of 300 public Japanese gardens outside Japan.



#### Lan Su Classical Chinese Garden

Walled compound on a full city block; influenced by Ming Dynasty gardens of Suzhou, from where the wood and designers come. One of most authentic outside of China.



#### **Portland Art Museum**

Renowned for its Asian collection, over 4,000 objects are housed in an entire wing of six galleries dedicated to the arts of China, Japan, Korea and India.



#### **Powell's City of Books**

In the world's largest bookstore, participants can browse the largest Asian Studies selection anywhere, plus sections for their own academic disciplines.
